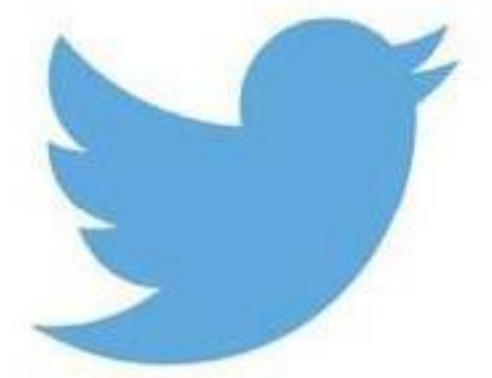




# Seen on social media
